Parents, Philanthropy and Cash Flow Highlight Semester

As another school year comes to a close, I thought this would be a nice time to reflect and look back at some of the events that have happened recently here at the Mansion.

The beginning of April brought us Parents' Weekend. For the first time since I have been here, we decided to do it in combination with a sorority, Alpha Chi Omega, and it really worked out well. In the week leading up to Parents' Weekend, many of the brothers formed a committee responsible for fixing any of the details of the house that we possible could. This included everything from rewiring the house audio system so that the same music could be heard throughout the house to having one of our more artistic brothers touch up the painting behind the bar originally painted by Brother Joe Fry '66 a "few" years back. I cannot even count the number of comments made to me by the parents, especially the parents who had been to the house in previous years. They indicated how impressed they were with the upkeep and the improvement in just the past two years.

As April progressed, we held our annual philanthropy, Superstars, to benefit the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of America. After being forced inside last year, we were thankful that this year the weather was cooperative. From canning, soliciting, our annual raffle, and the entrance fee from the 26 teams that competed this year, we were able to raise well over \$7,000. Even though only one team won, between the events, the barbecue and the refreshments, there was not a team that

wasn't asking when they would be able to sign up to return next spring.

Concerning the financial aspect of the fraternity, we have been able to run a budget surplus, even paying off the \$10,000 in debt left to us that the actives owed to the alumni. And we did this with only 25 brothers in the house. If we can do that with 25 people, imagine what we will be able to do next year when we are looking at having anywhere between 37 and 41 people living in the Mansion. The range of numbers is due to the fact that at the time of this writing, there are still a handful of brothers waiting to hear if they have been accepted to study abroad or whether they will get an internship for which they have applied.

I am also happy to report that we ranked ninth in GPA out of all the fraternities, which is especially impressive considering that this list includes those chapters that focus solely on academics. In addition, I would like to give credit to the several brothers who have recently taken their Medical College Admission Tests, performing well enough that they should have no problem getting into medical school.

There is a good strong group of dedicated brothers in the house whose main goal is to carry on the traditions of this fraternity and to leave it better than how we found it. Our dream is that generations to come can have the same experiences that you have had and that we are presently experiencing. We certainly do have a house in which to be proud.
